Ghana's achievement of independence in 1960 resulted, not unnaturally, in the recasting of the law. The author of this book took an active part in the preparation of the new legislation, and is therefore extremely well-qualified to present this authoritative exposition of the Constitutional Law of Ghana.

Not only does the author expound the provisions of the law as they exist; he also gives a certain amount of technical help wherever necessary. In this way he does much to lessen the problem facing those who suddenly find themselves confronted with such a mass of unfamiliar legislation.
