

TERMS

Our Terms are strictly CASH WITH THE ORDER. Appreciating the satisfaction derived both from selling and planting only the best bulbs, we have taken great pains that everything on our list should be of strictly first class quality. Besides, we have made VERY LOW PRICES, quality considered, hence we must request our friends to ask no indulgence from us in the way of time, but to enclose funds with the order.

Delivery—As bulbs and roots mature at different times during the fall and early winter, shipments will be made as follows: September, Anemones, Freesias, and Ranunculus. October includes the general list of bulbs as Tulips, Hyacinths, Daffodils and miscellaneous bulbs.

Your Name and Address should be written plainly on all orders. Please state whether bulbs are to be shipped by Parcel Post or Express. When no instructions are given we will ship as we think best.

In case of error or dissatisfaction of any kind, please notify us immediately so proper adjustment may be made.

Cash or satisfactory references should accompany all orders. As bulbs are perishable it is not advisable to send them C. O. D. If local checks are used, they must be certified.

Postage and Express Charges—ALL BULBS will be sent by Mail or Express, charges prepaid, when ordered at single or dozen rates. The 100 rates and over are by Express or Freight at purchaser's expense, unless otherwise stated. Not less than 6 of any one variety supplied at dozen rates, 25 at 100 rates, and 250 at 1,000 rates. SEEDS will be sent free by Mail, or Express, except as otherwise stated.

Substitution.—It sometimes occurs that our stock of some named varieties of Tulips or other bulbs becomes exhausted before the close of the season. In this case we shall take the liberty of substituting others similar in color and price, and equally as good, if not superior, to the ones ordered. Should any of our customers object to this, they will please so state in their orders.

We give no warranty, express or implied, as to description, purity, productiveness, or any other matter of any seeds or bulbs we send out, and we will not be in any way responsible for the crop. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these terms they are at once to be returned.




ANEMONE

Exceedingly brilliant and showy flowers. Plant in October or November, four or five inches apart. Cover one inch deep in moist, rich, well drained soil. If well protected by leaves or litter, very beautiful blossoms may be expected. Make the soil rich, and water frequently in the spring.

The bulbs may be kept till spring, when, if planted early, they will do well. For forcing indoors, put three or four roots in porous, rich soil in a five-inch pot. Keep in a cool situation until the roots are well started, when they may be removed to the place where they are to bloom.

De Caen Mixed The giant single variety. 70c per dozen; \$4.75 per 100.

St. Brigid Mixed Large semi-double flowers with finely divided petals. 80c per dozen; \$6.00 per 100.



Grape hyacinths (See Muscari, next page) are so dainty and so hardy that they should be better known. Plant a dozen bulbs or more and see how . pretty they are.

CALOCHORTUS (Mariposa Tulip)

Gay cup-shaped flowers, often several on a stem, are marked, veined, and spotted so that they resemble a butterfly's wings. These beautiful little blossoms in lilac, yellow, pink, and white are natives of California. Excellent in the rock garden in shady locations. Plant the bulbs in light soil, two inches deep, and three to four inches apart. Hardy only in moderate climates. Superb Mixture 70c per dozen; \$4.75 per 100.

CHIONODOXA (Glory of the Snow)

This early flowering spring bulb is desirable either in rock gardens or as a border edging. The little star-shaped flowers of charming blue are borne loosely on a small spike four to five inches long.

Plant the bulbs about three inches apart. If planted in clumps where they may be left undisturbed, they will continue to improve from year to year.

Luciliae Deep blue with white center. 50c per dozen; \$3.00 per 100.

Sardensis Rich gentian blue. 55c per dozen; \$3.25 per 100.

CLUSIANA (The Little Lady Tulip)

This dainty plant grows about nine inches high. The outer petals of the small flowers are rosy red while the inner petals are creamy white with violet base. If given a warm sheltered place and soil with plenty of humus, this plant will bloom very early. Clusiana is also fine for potting in the house. 11c each; 85c per dozen; \$6.50 per 100.

CROCUS

These are among the earliest bulbs to flower and are most effective when planted in masses or in borders. They are perfectly hardy and may be left in the ground undisturbed for three or

ERYTHRONIUM (Dog Tooth Violet)

These dainty lily-like flowers vary in color through shades of rose, yellow, pink, and white. They require a moist, well-drained soil and do particularly well in the shade. The bulbs should be set upright, two to three inches apart, with two or three inches of soil covering the tip of each.



Your Rock Garden and Border

FRITIL-LARIA

(Checkered Lily)

Maleagris Mixed The large drooping bell-shaped flowers are oddly splashed and striped. The plants grow only about 12 inches tall. Fine for rock gardens, for naturalizing, and for the border. Plant two inches deep and six inches apart. 60c per dozen; \$4.00 per 100.



The black centers of Ornithogalum are in striking contrast to the pure white petals.

A group of them, either indoors or outdoors, makes a pleasing picture.

MUSCARI

(Grape Hyacinth)

Every garden should have a few of these little plants with their straight slender spikes of tiny "grapes." They are very hardy, will grow almost anywhere, and increase rapidly, flowering more freely as they become established. For a charming picture, plant them in masses among the late flowering tulips, especially the pinks and the yellows.

Set the bulbs two to three inches deep in any ordinary garden soil. For indoor flowering four to six

bulbs in a five-inch pot will make a fine showing.

Heavenly Blue. "Heavenly" in fragrance as well as in color. The largest flowered and most desirable of all the Muscari. Bright sky blue. Height about eight inches. 50c per dozen; \$3.00 per 100.

ORNITHOGALUM

Arabicum Tall spikes bear loose clusters of cheery star-shaped blossoms, pure white with black centers. These bulb flowers are very hardy in the South and other mild climates, but they should be given protection when planted outdoors in the North. Culture in the house is about the same as for Hyacinths. 85c per dozen; \$6.50 per 100.

RANUNCULUS

These little spring flowering bulbs produce attractive double or semi-double flowers on stems about nine inches high. They comegin a wide range of colors—bright crimsons, scarlet, orange, pink, yellow, and white,

Ranunculus prefers a sunny situation and a well drained soil. Plant the bulbs two inches deep and six inches apart with the odd finger-like projections pointing downward. The bulbs may be soaked in water beforehand. October and November are the best planting months.

More Small Bulbs for Early Bloom

SCILLA

The bell-shaped Scillas follow the Crocus in season. The plants are perfectly hardy and the bulbs need not be disturbed oftener than once in three or four years. Scillas will thrive in any good garden soil. Plant them in October or November. Set the little bulbs about two inches deep and about an inch apart.

Campanulata Alba Maxima Clear white; fine large bells. 60c per dozen; \$4.00 per 100.

Campanulata Blue Queen Erect spikes of porcelain blue bells. 60c per dozen; \$4.00 per 100.

SNOWDROPS

The smallest garden ought to have from a dozen to a hundred Snowdrop bulbs to announce the appearance of spring with their cheerful dainty flowers. They are easy to grow and may be left in the

SNOWFLAKES (Leucojum vernum)


Pure white with green tips, these dainty blossoms resemble the Snowdrops. They are larger, though, and stronger in growth. Plant three inches deep and five inches apart. When once established they will take care of themselves. 85c per dozen; \$6.50 per 100.

Peonies for Permanent Plantings

Planted at intervals in the border with other flowers, or grouped by themselves, peonies are usually more effective than as single specimens on a lawn. The blossoms are more gorgeous than those of any other perennial. Many varieties are deliciously rose-fragrant.

Peonies need deep rich soil and plenty of water during the flowering season. Cover the crowns

with about two inches of soil when planting the roots.



No other plant gives such an abundance of gorgeous blossoms with less care than the peony.

These are Fine for Pot Plants

AMARYLLIS

Few bulbs are more satisfactory for indoor blooming than the Amaryllis. Each bulb produces two or three flower stems on which are several lily-like flowers of the most vivid colors in shades of vermilion, crimson, searlet, and pink.

Plant the bulbs, which are very large, in pots one to two inches larger in diameter and cover with soil only to the shoulder. Firm the soil around the bulbs, keep fairly cool, and water sparingly until growth starts; they may then be brought into a warmer room. Where the winters are not severe they may be grown out of doors and left in the ground permanently.


Belladonna Major Large, rose pink, trumpetshaped flowers, borne in clusters. 20c each; \$2.00 per dozen.

Vittati Hybrids Immense flowers with petals of velvety texture. The colors range through shades of red, scarlet, pink, and white. 75c each; \$7.50 per dozen.

FREESIA

Freesias are hardy only in a mild climate When planting outdoors, set them two inches deep and about four inches apart. They force easily and will bloom in January and February in the greenhouse. They also bloom readily in an ordinary living room if placed near a window and not kept too warm. These beautiful flowers are very sweet scented.



IXIA (African Corn Lily)

Brilliant scarlets, blues, purples, yellows are all present in this gorgeous little flower. The center of the blossom always differs from the other parts in color. The narrow pointed petals add to the plant's attractiveness.

Grow Ixias outdoors only in a moderate climate. Plant two inches deep and six inches apart in a sunny spot. Also good for indoor culture.

Why not grow several pots of top-size hyacinths to furnish color in the house this winter? Plant some of the smaller bulbs, too, outdoors in front of low-growing evergreens or shrubs.

Delicious fragrance and fine coloring make Hyacinths delightful both as winter pot plants and as early outdoor flowers in spring. They are among the easiest bulb flowers to grow in the house, and when properly planted and cared for outdoors they are as hardy as Tulips and Daffodils.

House Culture

Plant from September to December in well-drained pots of light, rich, sandy soil. Place each bulb so that the top is just below the surface. Have the soil fine and loose so that the bulbs will not push out when the roots begin to grow. Water thoroughly, and set the pots in a cool dark place for several weeks until a strong root growth has formed. Water occasionally if the soil dries out. Bring the pots into the light gradually after top growth begins, keep at a temperature of 60 to 70 degrees, and water often. Hyacinths can also be grown successfully in glasses. Large size bulbs are best for house culture.

Garden Culture

Plant bulbs any time from October until the ground freezes. In light soil, set bulbs four or five inches deep; in heavy soil, not more than two or three inches. An inch or two of sand beneath each bulb will take care of excess moisture. Always cover hyacinth beds with straw or leaves before freezing weather. In severe climates mulching to a depth of three or four inches is necessary.

HYACINTHS FOR THE GARDEN

Hyacinth bulbs especially suitable for planting outdoors are smaller than those of Exhibition size. They produce spikes that are shorter and more compact so that they withstand wind and other outside conditions better than those more top-heavy. The excellent named varieties offered in this list are uniform in height and season of blooming. The colors are delightful, either alone or together in the garden or flower border.

Plant Narcissus Bulbs Outdoors

Daffodil and Narcissus are really two names for the same flowers. Daffodil is the English name, and Narcissus the Latin. Among gardeners and those in the flower trade, however, the flowers with large trumpets are known as Daffodils; those with small cups are Narcissus. The difficulty of distinguishing between them increases somewhat each year because of the many beautiful hybrids that are being developed. Jonquils can be recognized particularly by their grass-like foliage.

Plant Narcissus bulbs outdoors somewhat earlier than those of Tulips. August or September is suitable. Set them four or five inches apart and about four inches deep, measuring from the shoulder of the bulb to

the surface of the ground.

Unless otherwise indicated our Narcissus are all choicest quality, first size, round bulbs.

TRUMPET DAFFODILS

These flowers are of very large size. The perianth or petals are from 2½ to 4 inches across, while the trumpet or tube is 1½ to 2 inches in length, often measuring longer than the petals. The blossoms are borne on stiff stems from 12 to 18 inches long.

King Alfred Golden yellow perianth and trumpet. Considered the most desirable of all the deep yellow varieties. 15c each; \$1.30 per dozen; \$10.50 per 100. Emperor One of the best known Daffodils. CROWN OR SHORT CUP DAFFODILS

Daffodils belonging to this group are crosses between the Trumpet and the Poeticus Narcissus. The crown, or center cup, is about one-half inch in length.



Early in Fall DOUBLE DAFFODILS

Hardy double Daffodils are much liked for outdoor planting. They also succeed well indoors.

POETAZ NARCISSUS

Orange Cup Yellow perianth; frilled cup of orange red. 12c each; 95c per dozen; \$7.00 per 100.

POETICUS NARCISSUS

These have a white perianth with a small flattened yellow cup or eye. Perfectly hardy and easy to naturalize.

Poeticus (Recurvis, Pheasant's Eye, or Poet's Narcissus) Pure white perianth, orange cup, bordered scarlet. A very fragrant variety. 10c each; 75c per dozen; \$5.00 per 100.

Poeticus Ornatus Pure white, yellow cup, margin deep scarlet. It is not so sweetly perfumed as the Poeticus but is larger, showier, and earlier. 11c each; 85c per dozen; \$6.00 per 100.

Horace Pure white perianth, conspicuous red eye, free flowering and strong stemmed. Fine for forcing. 12c each; \$1.00 per dozen; \$7.50 per 100.

POLYANTHUS NARCISSUS

With its clusters of fragrant blossoms, this flower is easy to grow in ordinary living room temperatures. The bulbs do well in broad low bowls filled either with fibre or pebbles. If fibre is used, keep it moist but not too wet; if pebbles are used, put in enough of them to keep the bulbs from falling over and fill the dish with water. Keep out of strong light until roots are formed. The flowers should bloom in four to six weeks.



Tuck some Poeticus bulbs beneath the shrubs, or scatter them along the perennial border. This is Horace with flaming red center.

Paper White Grandiflora Flowers pure snow white, desirable for their beauty and fragrance. 10c each; 75c per dozen; \$5.00 per 100.

Grand Soleil D'Or Yellow with orange cup. Excellent for forcing. 18c each; \$1.50 per dozen; \$12.00 per 100.

Chinese Sacred Lily (Narcissus Orientalis) The flowers of this variety of Polyanthus Narcissus introduced from China are satiny white with golden yellow cup. They are borne profusely in clusters and are very fragrant. 14c each; \$1.15 per dozen; \$9.00 per 100.

JONQUILS (Narcissus Jonquilla)

A slender and graceful plant with rather small, bright yellow, deliciously fragrant flowers, abundantly produced on stems about a foot long, each bearing a cluster of florets. Leaves quill-like, glossy dark green. Well suited for window plants, and most satisfactory outdoors when planted in large groups or masses. Culture same as Narcissus.

Campernelle (Odorus) Single, large yellow florets, about one and one-half inches across. Fine for cutting. 12c each; \$1.00 per dozen; \$7.00 per 100.

Double Campernelle (Odorus Plenus) The true and rare form of double Campernelle. Flowers fragrant, and quite double. 12c each; \$1.00 per dozen; \$7.00 per 100.

Tulips-Spring's First Gay Colors!

Tulips may be planted any time from October until the ground freezes. Set them three to six inches apart and about four inches deep, measuring from the shoulder of the bulb to the surface of the ground. Good drainage is very important. An inch or two of sand beneath each bulb when it is planted will take care of excess moisture which might cause the bulbs to rot. Tulips are so hardy that they need winter protection only in severe climates. A light mulching after the ground is frozen is sufficient.

Many varieties of Tulips are popular for winter flowering. If potted in September and treated the same as hyacinths (see page 6), they will usually bloom in December. From three to twelve bulbs planted in a suitable pot make a splendid showing.

A, B, C, etc., following the name of a variety, refer to time of blooming when planted outdoors:

A-earliest.

B—come into bloom before those marked A are gone.

C-a few days later than the B Class.

Letters d, m, or t (dwarf, medium, or tall) indicate comparative heights when bulbs are grown outdoors. This is useful in selecting varieties for border planting.

SINGLE EARLY TULIPS

(Bloom in Early Spring)

Single Early Tulips produce the first splash of brilliant color in the garden. To make the best display they should be planted in large masses. Single Early varieties begin flowering from one to two weeks sooner than the later kinds. They mature and ripen their leaves early enough so that they can be taken up to make room for annuals and other plants. Single Earlies are the easiest of all Tulips to grow indoors.

DOUBLE

(Bloom in Early Spring)

Double Early Tulips are especially desirable in the garden because they hold their bloom longer than the Single Earlies. They bridge the gap between the Single Early and the Late Tulips, thus extending the season of gorgeous beauty from late April until nearly June.

The flowers of Double Tulips are larger than those of Single Earlies and look much like peonies. They are more open and broader than the cup-shaped Single types. When planted in a mass of one color, they are especially effective, making a solid sheet of bloom that often hides the leaves.

Double Tulips need soil that is somewhat richer than that for the Single Earlies in order to perfect their huge blossoms. Bonemeal is usually a safer fertilizer to use than manure. If manure is used, it should be thoroughly rotted and carefully mixed with the soil some months before the bulbs are planted.

The earliest of the Double Tulips succeed fairly well in pots.

Boule de Neige B m. Large very double flowers of pure white resembling white peonies. 11c each; 90c per dozen; \$7.00 per 100.







Start Your Flower Garden This Fall



We are now able to offer seed of our Rust Resistant Antirrhinum (Snapdragon) in separate colors and shades. Look for them on this page. These "Snaps" have a high percentage of resistance against the rust blight.

Where the climate is fairly mild, many of the hardy perennials, annuals, and biennials bring excellent results if seeds are sown in the open ground in August, September, and October. Seeds of annuals should be sown late enough so that they will lie dormant during the winter. They will then begin to grow earlier in spring, the plants will be stronger and will blossom sooner than if the seed is sown in spring. Plants like Columbine, Delphinium, Foxglove, and Hollyhock that do not bloom until the second year unless planted very early in spring are especially satisfactory for fall planting. Start them not later than the middle of September. Give them protection if the weather is at all severe.




